#### PRIMARY TRANSITION

This half term Mrs Humphreys has worked with Eastcroft Primary School, where the students worked on how to read music and learnt how to play a song on the keyboard. They were able to all perform independently showing the Kirkby Child value of confidence.

Mrs Humphreys also got to work with Kirkby Church of England school to prepare them for their Christmas concert, where they have learnt to play Jingle Bells on the Glockensp iels. They are due to perform in St Chad's Church on 17th December. It was a pleasure teaching both classes.

#### REWARDS

Our ever popular Kirkby Child rewards strategy has seen over 600 students rewarded this term. Based on student voice we have provided gift vouchers, doughnuts and our festive cinema rewards trip.

As well as wider rewards over 400 students have earned a Kirkby Child badge to wear with pride for their commitment to our Kirkby Child values.

#### PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Year 7 have made a great start to their life studying PD at Kirkby High School, enjoying lessons on getting to know each other, healthy & unhealthy lifestyles, and the positives of intervening in bullying situations.

Meanwhile, Year 8 & 9 have experienced sessions on careers & options choices, knife crime, and neurodiversity, whilst Year 10 looked at legal & illegal drugs then Work Experience preparing them for next May. Year 11 have been learning about various topics, including drugs & the law, exploitative relationships and the history of protest.

Out of lessons, Merseyside Police came into school in September to deliver their very powerful Operation Prospect workshop to Years 9 & 10, and students from all year groups have attended weekly Rainbow Club sessions, getting to know each other and how our brains can work differently!

Year 8 have made a truly fantastic start to the year, demonstrating maturity, enthusiasm and a real commitment to their learning.

This half term in form, students have explored a wide range of important themes including gratitude, human rights, tolerance, remembrance, kindness, values, hope and antisocial behaviour. During our Remembrance activities, Year 8 took part in the national minute's silence with great respect, showing real understanding of its significance.

Alongside this, students have continued to work hard across all areas of the curriculum, engaging positively with lessons and contributing thoughtfully in class.

A special mention goes to Mrs Frodsham's Year 8 maths class, who have shown excellent focus, resilience and teamwork—she has been genuinely impressed with their effort and progress this term.





A highlight of the term was the Year 8 trip. Students recently enjoyed an enriching visit to Quarry Bank Mill, an iconic industrial mill with origins dating back to the 1750s. During their tour, students explored the historic machinery, working spaces and living conditions that shaped life during the Industrial Revolution.

Not only were students fascinated by the hands-on learning experience, but their behaviour throughout the day was exemplary, reflecting both their enthusiasm and maturity.

The trip proved to be a memorable blend of education and conduct worthy of celebration.

#### YEAR 11 AFTER SCHOOL REVISION

To support our Year 11 students in preparation for their GCSE exams, we have been running after-school revision sessions every Wednesday from 3:10 pm to 4:10 pm.

These sessions focus on key topics and exam techniques to help students maximise their potential.

### HOMEWORK CLUB TUESDAY LUNCHTIME

For any student who needs extra help or a quiet space to complete their homework, our Homework Club runs every Tuesday during lunchtime in Room CM2.

Staff will be available to provide guidance and support.

### STAFF DEVELOPMENT WITH NCETM MATHS HUBS

This year we are excited to be working with Maths Hubs and the Kirkby Collaborative again with the years 5-8 continuity programme.

The Kirkby primary and secondary schools are working together to develop consistent approaches to teaching certain topics so that our students all learn 'The Kirkby Way'.

#### **NUMERACY INTERVENTIONS**

Some of our KS3 students have begun numeracy intervention, helping them to build upon skills such as visual memory, comparing numbers and using number facts.

The intervention aims to help overcome and barriers to learning, anxiety and provides targeted support. You can support at home by playing memory games, ensuring your child can tell the time, use bus and train timetables and estimate the total of a shopping bill including change.



Year 10 have embraced the transition into their GCSE curriculum with real maturity. They have shown a great attitude to learning in lessons and are already demonstrating independence. Classrooms across all subjects are filled with students eager to contribute, asking questions and pushing themselves to achieve their very best.

We are also incredibly proud to announce that several Year 10 students have successfully applied and been selected to join the Student Leadership Team.

The application process was competitive, with students demonstrating excellent communication skills, commitment to the school community and a willingness to take on responsibility. Our new leaders will play an important role in representing student voice, supporting school events and acting as positive role models for younger years.

As we move deeper into the GCSE year, we are excited to continue supporting Year 10 on their academic and personal development journeys. With the momentum they have already built, we are confident this will be a year full of progress, achievementand pride.

#### COMPUTER SCIENCE

Our Year 10 Computer Science students had an exciting opportunity this term as they visited The Spine in Liverpool to explore the rapidly evolving world of AI technology. Throughout the day, students took part in a range of aspirational and intellectually challenging workshops that showcased cutting-edge innovations and encouraged them to think deeply about the future of computing.

The sessions pushed students to consider how artificial intelligence is shaping global industries, healthcare, education, and everyday life. They engaged brilliantly with hands-on activities, asked thoughtful questions and represented the school with maturity and curiosity. This inspiring experience not only broadened students' understanding of AI but also encouraged them to think ambitiously about their own future pathways in technology.

We are incredibly proud of their efforts and look forward to seeing how this experience fuels their passion for Computer Science.



#### WORK EXPERIENCE

Meetings with all Year 10 students are now underway to support them in securing meaningful, career-focused work experience placements, guided closely by the school's careers advisors.

Through personalised discussions, careers fairs and targeted school assemblies, students are being helped to explore sectors that match their interests and ambitions.

Many students are already demonstrating key employability skills such as growing confidence, clear communication and rising aspiration which will prepare them well for successful and purposeful placements that enhance their understanding of the world of work.



#### TRIPS AND VISITS

Our Year 9 students embarked on an exciting aviation trip to the Manchester Flight Simulation Centre. During the trip, they had the opportunity to learn the fundamentals of piloting three different aircrafts using state-of-the-art simulators.

The sessions were led by industry professionals—a British Airways Captain and a First Officer from Ryanair—who shared their expertise and real-world insights into the world of aviation. Students practised essential flight skills, explored cockpit controls, and gained a deeper understanding of what it takes to operate commercial aircraft.

The trip inspired many of our students to consider future careers in the airline industry.





# YEAR 9 CAREERS TRIP TO MANCHESTER AIRPORT



Our Year 9 students recently visited Manchester Airport for an inspiring careers-focused trip. The day highlighted the wide range of opportunities available within the aviation industry.

A key theme of the visit was the importance of languages in different careers. Students discovered how multilingual skills can open doors to roles in customer service, air traffic control, cabin crew, and international

business operations. They learned that effective communication across cultures is essential in a global industry like aviation. This experience gave students a real insight into how language learning can enhance employability.

# STUDENT PREFECT TRAINING DAY

All learners are now underway with their applications and have been supported through personalised 1:1 guidance as well as drop-in application sessions delivered by further education providers, ensuring they feel confident, informed and ready for their next steps beyond school.

#### **PERSONAL SAFETY**

#### **Look confident**

You are less likely to be targeted if you look confident. Move with purpose and try to be aware of your surroundings.

#### Know where you're going

Plan your route and think about what to take with you, especially if you're going somewhere you haven't been before. Keep to busy, well-lit streets, walkways and paths which are more likely to be covered by CCTV. Only take licensed taxis or minicabs booked by phone or a mobile phone app.

#### Keep your distance

When walking behind someone, particularly at night, try to leave a good amount of distance between yourself and the person ahead of you. Remember that the closer you are, the more threatening you might seem.

#### Cross the road

Somebody running up behind you, particularly at night, can be frightening. If you're out for an evening run, or walk, and see someone walking ahead, cross the road, call out to let them know you're about to run by them or make sure to leave a good amount of space when you pass them.

#### **Keep comments to yourself**

What you might think of as just a bit of fun, or flattery, can be insulting, upsetting or even scary to someone else. Keep any comments or opinions to yourself.

#### Keep your friends in line

If you're in a group of people where someone is harassing another person on the street, try to calm the situation. They may just need to be told that they're behaving inappropriately.

#### **Protect your mobile phones:**

- · Don't leave your phone, iPad, tablet or camera unattended, out of your sight, or left on a table. Thieves can grab a phone from a table in seconds.
- · Be aware of your surroundings and only use your mobile when it feels safe to.
- · When you've finished using it, put it away.
- · Secure your phone
- · Use your phone's security features to stop someone using your phone if it's stolen. Choose a strong PIN, passcode, password or pattern.
- · Get your IMEI number
- · Get your phone's IMEI number by typing \*#06# on your phone keypad. Keep a note of it somewhere other than on your phone. The IMEI can help track the phone down if it's lost or stolen.

#### Use a tracking app

Set up a tracking app on your phone so you can see where it is from another device like a laptop. Use it as soon as possible, before thieves have a chance to disable it.

Advice and Support for parents and carers of LGBT+ young people
